Erom an immigration perspective, it is possible to change your program of study at NBCC. If the program of study is at the same institution (NBCC) then you do not need to notify Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) since all of our programs fall under the same designated learning institution (DLI) number. You only need to notify IRCC if you are changing institutions (see: Changing your school or program - Canada.ca).
If you are changing to a shorter program of study, it is important to note that your study permit becomes invalid 90 days after you have completed your program of study or on the expiry date, whichever comes first (Source: <a href="Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations (justice.gc.ca">Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations (justice.gc.ca</a> )). This may also impact the duration of your post-graduation work permit (PGWP) (Source: <a href="Post-graduation work permit">Post-graduation work permit (PGWP) validity and application - Canada.ca</a> ), resulting in a shorter PGWP.
: If your study permit application is still pending when you receive a letter of acceptance to a different or later NBCC program, then you can update Immigration, Refugees, and Otizenship Canada (IRCC) about the change in your program of study by uploading the new letter of acceptance, a letter of explanation, and a revised study plan via an <a href="IRCC Webform (cic.gc.ca">IRCC Webform (cic.gc.ca</a> ).
